



President's Message

When we started Twice Upon a Time in May 2014, on a sunny day outside Heartwood House, I doubt any of us (visitors or volunteers!) could have envisioned a day when it would be difficult or even perhaps dangerous to share a book with a few friends while sitting on a foam mat outside a community organization.

This has been an understandably difficult year for all of us not just due to the pandemic but also because of increasing calls for racial justice in the wake of several deaths of Black and Indigenous people at the hands of the police. We continue to say your names: George Floyd. Breonna Taylor. Regis Korchinski-Paquet. Chantel Moore. Tony McDade. Abdirahman Abdi. Sheffield Matthews. Ejaz Choudry. Rodney Levi. Daunte Wright. These crises have been top of mind not just for those of us involved in Twice Upon a Time, and they have shaped the way we provide our services. Equity and diversity have always been core to our values, but in light of the events of the past year, we have renewed our commitment to providing children with books that can inspire understanding, compassion, and growth, and in which they can see themselves represented. Our 2017 and 2018 project to purchase books by and about Indigenous peoples was a start, but we must and will do better. We are committing to increasing our spending on new book acquisitions for books by and about the BIPOC communities, particularly those with Black characters and by Black authors.

The pandemic also changed things for us in 2020. Just recently, I responded to an email from a mum who used to visit us at Overbrook Community Centre, but who hasn't been able to since all our locations closed in March 2020. We arranged for a volunteer to meet her at our storage unit and provide her with some books for her four children. While we have helped kids find great books to read in new and different ways this year, that spark of excitement at sharing wonderful stories with those we love remains the same! We gave away 3569 books this year, which is a decrease from previous years, but given the nature of our work, I think it's a number to be very proud of.

President's Message

I have to share a heartfelt thank you here to our Acquisitions Committee (read more about their work on page 11), who continued to receive and process donations, purchase material to supplement our offerings when necessary, and work with the Fundraising Committee to meet our obligations for reporting on grants received. In the pandemic, their work grew exponentially: with our locations closed, Acquisitions volunteers became the main point of contact with our community partners, who distributed books on our behalf to their clients. Rather than seeing families directly at our locations, a tenet that is core to our values and our service model, we worked closely with new and existing partners to provide them with boxes of books for their clients. We developed a questionnaire to ensure that the books provided met the needs and interests of the children they were serving, and arranged for pick-up or delivery while respecting and appreciating necessary health measures.

Thanks also to the hardworking folks on the Fundraising Committee, we received more support from local grant agencies than ever before, more than doubling our donations over last year. An enthusiastic thank you to all our donors, who believe, as we do, in the importance of having books in the home to support early literacy skills and a love of reading.

Reading has been my solace during the pandemic (as during many times of stress), as has being outdoors. I was thrilled to meet with several of our volunteers and supporters in the Emerald Plaza neighbourhood last fall to celebrate Sarah Simpkin's "Tour de branch" bike tour of all 33 branches of the Ottawa Public Library, a fundraiser for Twice Upon a Time. It was wonderful to see other people in person, and combine my love of cycling and reading to support a friend in a noble goal.

President's Message

We experienced some turnover on our Board in the last year (read more about that on page 11), and there is more to come! It has been almost a decade since our first planning meeting in October 2012, and I will be stepping down as president this summer. This is an exciting opportunity for a new president to take Twice Upon a Time to the next level. Recruiting during a pandemic may be challenging, and we are currently exploring an Interim President role, supported by a core team of Board members, and advertising for a new president later in 2021. We value the diversity of our Board of Directors, and are excited to add a new perspective to our team. We are committed to recognising, respecting and appreciating individual differences, and we welcome the unique contributions a new president can offer to make our Board, and our organization, stronger.

It has been an honour and a true gift to see Twice Upon a Time grow from an idea to a thriving organization that was able to weather an unprecedented year with commitment, flexibility, and creativity. I often tell people that as a non-native Ottawan, my involvement in this project has provided me with innumerable opportunities to see how caring, empathetic, and thoughtful Ottawans are. Thank you to all our community partners, tireless volunteers, and the families who share a love of reading and remind us regularly how much the work we do means to them.

Kids Today! Special COVID-19 Project

Our biggest undertaking this year was sparked by the pandemic of the COVID-19 virus. In late 2019, we decided that our focus for 2020 was going to be "Kids Today! The Most Popular New Children's Books." When the pandemic hit, however, the needs of "Kids Today!" took on a dramatically different tone. Since our traditional free bookstore sites were closed and we were no longer able to meet with children and families in our usual way, we had to come up with an innovative solution to deliver books into the homes of Ottawa kids. The "Kids Today! Special COVID-19 Project" was launched.

In June 2020, we made our first deliveries to our community partners. We teamed up with community health centres, literacy groups, and other organizations who could distribute or mail books directly to their clients. Both Twice Upon a Time and all these partner groups employed strict health and safety protocols and procedures. Through the enthusiasm, hard work and efforts of all the volunteers involved in this initiative over the course of the summer, we were able to select and deliver 1050 books to Ottawa children. The assistance of these partner groups was truly invaluable in providing information on the number of children they serve and what sort of books the children might want. We cannot thank them enough for their help.

As the first round of the project came to a close, we were unfortunately no closer to re-opening any of our free bookstore locations. With that in mind, the Board approved a second round of the project, which brought us to the end 2020. Book Acquisitions

Despite COVID, 2,575 books were donated to Twice Upon a Time in 2020. These books were carefully sorted by the Acquisitions team for suitability for our program. Book donations do not always meet our selection criteria, so in those instances we donate the books to local thrift stores.

Due to the pandemic, the Acquisitions committee created protocols and guidelines to follow when at the Twice Upon a Time storage locker at Dymon and when making deliveries to our partner organizations. These protocols require that all books are now quarantined for the time recommended by public health guidelines, and that our volunteers also follow the strict Ottawa Public Health guidelines at all times. Our community partners also advise us of their COVID-19 protocols and guidelines.

Special Donations

For the third time, Twice Upon a Time friend Sophia Ballafini held her birthday book drive and donated 556 books. This year, Sophia and her family met with us at our storage locker to deliver her donation, where she was excited to learn about how we store and sort books into colour-coded boxes based on type and language of book.

Marni Squire, site lead for our Taggart Y free bookstore location, organized a neighbourhood book drive in Old Ottawa South. She received over 200 donations.

Volunteers

As with most things during this pandemic, our volunteer operations came to an abrupt suspension of service in March of 2020. We were unable to operate out of our various partner locations. However, we were able to distribute books through our current and new partners. Thanks to our Fundraising Team and Acquisitions team, we were able to provide over 2,500 books to children, in addition to the approximately 1000 we distributed prior to the start of the pandemic.

During our COVID-19 special project, two of our volunteers - Sue Cole and Julie Raincourt - have been instrumental in sorting, selecting and delivering new and gently used books to Ottawa children via our Community partners. They also assisted in purchasing new books in both English and French. Their passion for this project and the time and effort they have contributed are greatly appreciated. We could not have done it without them, and we send a special thank you to them. See page 12 for more on one of these special volunteers.

On our Board of Directors, it was a year of new beginnings. Ranya Tantawy stepped down as our Treasurer after the sudden early arrival of her new son. Laura George Fernandes, our Vice-President, stepped down temporarily to welcome her new daughter. We send congratulations to them both, and a thank you for their work with Twice Upon a Time. We welcomed new board members, Ash Ravindran as our new Treasurer, and Stéphanie Plante took on the Acting Vice President role.

We would also like to recognize and thank Chantal Renaud, our volunteer translator, who allows us to provide our written materials in both official languages. Merci beaucoup, Chantal!

And finally, a big thank you to all of our volunteers, who help us serve children and families in the Ottawa area. We look forward to a safe return to our regular operations.



Volunteer Spotlight: Sue Cole

I was driving home on the last day of school in June 2018 when I heard about Twice Upon a Time on the radio. I knew I was retiring from teaching the next year and I was excited to hear about an organization that combined two things I loved - children and books. I called the next day and by August I was trained to work at the Overbrook Community Centre. It was very rewarding to see the children's eyes light up when they walked in and could see the books to choose from. Parents frequently expressed gratitude for this opportunity.

Once I was retired, I had more time and joined the acquisition team. In the past year our team took on a new role of purchasing, sorting and delivering books to communities across Ottawa. If they couldn't come to us, we'd go to them. Choosing books for children you don't know can be challenging but I believe that our team did an excellent job providing quality literature to hundreds, if not thousands, of children. During Covid, I believe these books have provided joy to many as they self isolate. I am grateful to my fellow volunteers and to the organization for providing me this opportunity. It has truly been a pleasure.

Twice Upon a Time is regularly recruiting new volunteers. We post volunteer opportunities with Volunteer Ottawa, and would invite you to vist their website for information on any current vacancies.



Our Supporters

The year 2020 was very unusual for everyone. However, individuals, organizations and corporations were more generous than ever, helping us to bring the joy of reading and the gift of strengthened literacy to hundreds of Ottawa's children.

In 2020, as Twice Upon a Time pivoted to a new service model, we received \$38,115 in financial contributions, an increase of 156% over 2019 (\$14,883). In addition to encouraging and receiving donations all year round, our organization mounted two targeted campaigns and received grants from foundations and the Government of Canada. The focus on all fundraising initiatives was to support our 2020 campaign Kids Today! The Most Popular New Children's Books, which will continue as our 2021 development and fundraising theme.

We'd also like to highlight one very special fundraising initiative that was undertaken by local academic librarian, Twice Upon a Time supporter, and cycling enthusiast Sarah Simpkin. Sarah explored the city by visiting every one of the Ottawa Public Library's 33 branches (and the bookmobile!) on her bike in what came to be known as the "Tour de branch." From her home near the Experimental Farm, some trips were short while others, like the overnight to Fitzroy Harbour, were more than 50 km. Sarah donated 50 cents/km to Twice Upon a Time. Other friends and librarians joined or supported her and together they raised almost \$2,000. Thank you Sarah!
